

ARC-CO Irrigation Designations



Agricultural Risk Coverage at the County Level (ARC-CO) historically only allowed a separate guarantee for irrigated and non-irrigated crops in a county that had at least 25% of it's production of a commodity in both practices.

New provisions of the 2018 Farm Bill allows for many more counties to have a separate irrigated and non-irrigated designation for ARC-CO. To meet the criteria for separate guarantees, a county had to have irrigated and non-irrigated RMA (crop insurance) data at least 3 out of the 5 years between 2013-2017 or, from looking at FSA data, have at least 10% of the production for the commodity in each practice between 2013-2017 AND average at least 5,000 acres of the commodity planted every year from 2013-2017.

A Historical Irrigation Percentage (HIP) will be assigned to each farm for each commodity in a county that has an irrigation designation based dividing the *irrigated* acres of that commodity from 2013-2017 by the *total* acres planted of that commodity between 2013-2017. HIP will remain with the farm, 2019 through 2023.

The ARC-CO benchmark, guarantee, and actual revenue will be weighted by the HIP for each farm to get one ARC-CO payment per farm based on both the irrigated and non-irrigated guarantees.

The following table lists the 2018 Farm Bill county irrigation designations for Kansas. An "X" means the county will have separate irrigated and non-irrigated ARC-CO guarantees.
